My Assembly 2022 Experience in Gratitude.

This was the first 3-day Assembly in two years and the preparation prior to attending was a bit overwhelming, but I felt prepared and ready to do my job.

Upon my arrival the fellowship began with hugs and the joy of seeing members that I had missed for years. Visiting on the elevators or in the hallways. Being with team members that I have only seen on Zoom for the past 2 years. I was reminded that "Service is Gratitude in Action" and I was grateful to be here.

We came together to do the business of NCWSA Al-Anon and it was so exciting that about 14 District 18 members were there: GRs (Group Representatives), AGRs (Alternate Group Representatives), DR (District Representative) and ADR (Alternate District Representative). I asked them all to stand with me when I got up to give the DR report and our holler. "The Message is Simple, Recovery is Keen, Everyone is Welcome, In District 18". We were only allotted 3 minutes to report, so I talked fast. There was so much I wanted to say about all our District Officers and Coordinators, but I kept it simple and covered our successes. We did a mighty fine job with Events and Public Outreach. Both revolved around our purpose, caring the Message to those that still suffer, Tradition 5.



Al-Anon service is Gratitude in Action.


